

## Notice of Mining Location

NOTICE HEREBY IS GIVEN that the undersigned locators, each a citizen of the United States or one who has declared his intention to become such, have discovered a vein or lode of mineral bearing rock in place upon the unappropriated public domain of the United States within the State of Oregon and said Mining District; and in accordance with the laws of the United States, of the State of Oregon and the regulations of said Mining District, have located and do hereby locate a claim upon such vein or lode by posting this notice of such discovery and location on a substantial post at the point of discovery, marked Post No. 1. The name of the claim is *Block Hill*. Claim, further described as follows:

Commencing at a post marked No. 1 (Discovery Post), from thence

40 feet in a *northwesterly* direction to an end post marked No. 2, thence  
300 feet in a *westerly* direction to a corner post marked No. 3, thence  
500 feet in a *southwesterly* direction to a corner post marked No. 4, thence  
300 feet in a *Easterly* direction to an end post marked No. 5, thence  
300 feet in a *Castellated* direction to a corner post marked No. 6, thence  
1500 feet in a *Northwesterly* direction to a corner post marked No. 7, thence  
300 feet in a *Nesterly* direction to said end post marked No. 2.

The locators claim 400 feet in a Northwesterly direction from point of discovery to the Center m<sup>a</sup> 2 end line and 1500 feet in the opposite direction from point of discovery to the M<sup>a</sup> 5 end line and 300 feet on each side of the middle of said vein or lode, further claiming all the surface rights, privileges and minerals, with all tips, spurs, angles and variations, and other rights granted by existing laws and customs. This claim is further described as being 200 feet from a natural object or permanent monument in the vicinity, to-wit: R.O.A.D. S-420 (use township and range, if possible)

The general course or strike of the vein or lode as nearly as may be determined is Southwestly, with reference to the natural object or permanent monument described above. The adjoining claims are 19

This notice is placed at discovery post No. 1; posts are placed at each corner and both center ends, and the name of this vein or lode and date of location are placed on all posts so that the boundaries of the claim may be readily traced. In construing this location notice, the singular includes the plural and vice versa, where the context so requires.

## Excerpts from the mining laws of the United States, 30 U.S. Code Annotated

Sec. 23. "A mining claim may be made and shall not exceed 1500 feet in length along the vein or lode; but the location of such claim shall be made and it shall cover every part of the vein or lode within the limits of the claim located. No claim shall extend more than 300 feet beyond either side of the midline of the vein or lode measured." The mid-line of each claim shall be parallel to each other.

Sec. 28. "All records of mining claims, etc., shall contain the name or names of the locator(s), the date of the location, and such a

description of the claim or claims located by reference to some natural object or permanent monument or will identify the claim."

Sec. 35. "Placer claims, including all forms of deposit excepting veins and lodes or other rock in place shall be subject to entry and possession, . . . upon similar proceedings as are provided for veins and lodes claims. . . . no such location shall include more than twenty acres for each individual claim."

## Excerpts from Chapter 517, Oregon Revised Statutes Re: Location—Vein and Lode Claims

517.010. Location of mining claims upon veins or lodes. (a) Any person, a citizen of the United States, or one who has declared his intention to become such, who discovers a vein or lode of mineral-bearing rock in place upon the unappropriated public domain of the United States within this state, may locate a claim upon such vein or lode by posting thereon a notice of such discovery and location. The notice shall contain:

(a) The name of the locator(s); (b) The names of the locators;

(c) The date of the location;

(d) The number of linear feet claimed along the vein or lode in each way from the point of discovery with the width on each side of the lode or vein;

(e) The general course or strike of the vein or lode its elevation as may be, with reference to some natural object or permanent monument giving the vicinity; and by marking the boundary exposed the surface of each claim so that the same may be readily traced;

(f) Such boundaries shall be marked within 30 days after posting of such notice by six substantial posts, projecting rods, pegs, stones, or pegs above the surface of the ground, and no less than four inches square or in diameter, or substantial mounds of stone, or earth and stone, at least two feet in height, and with one upon post or mound of rock at each corner and at the center ends of such claims.

517.039. Recording copy of discovery notice. (a) The locator shall, within 60 days from the posting of the location notice by him upon the

lode or claim, file the log record with the recorder of conveyances, if there is one, who shall be the keeper of mining records and miners' liens, or otherwise with the clerk of the county where the claim is situated, a copy of the notice posted by him upon the lode or claim and shall pay the recorder a record fee of \$1.00 for such records which shall be recorded at once and immediately pay over to the treasurer of the county and shall take his receipt therefor, as in case of other county bonds issued into the possession of such officer. The recorder or clerk shall immediately record the location notice.

517.040. Abandoned claims. Abandoned claims are unappropriated mineral lands, and titles thereto shall be obtained as specified in ORS 517.039 to 517.030, without reference to any work previously done thereon.

517.060. Correcting defective notices of location. If at any time an individual who has located a mining claim within the meaning of ORS 517.030 or 517.044, assigns, transfers, or leases, or sells, or that the original notice of location of the mining claim was defective or erroneous, or that the requirements of the law had not been complied with before the filing of the notice, such assignee or assignor may post and file for record in the manner now provided by law, an amended notice of the location which shall relate back to the date of the original location; provided, that the posting and filing of the amended notice of location shall not interfere with the existing rights of others at the time of recording the amended



The following is a quotation from information furnished the publisher by the State of Oregon Department of Geology and Mineral Industries.

## Necessary steps in locating a vein or lode claim:

1. Post notice of location at point of discovery.
2. File copy of notice of location with county clerk or recorder for the county in which the claim is located. Filing fee is \$1.00 per claim. Notice may be mailed in for recording. Notice should be recorded within 60 days from the posting of the notice on the claim.

Placer claims are located where minerals occur in place in veins or lodes or in alluvium such as stream gravel and gold-bearing alluvium. Alluvial deposits of non-metallic minerals such as limestone, building stone, and pumice are generally located as placer claims.
