

Location of the "May Day Number 1" Mining Claim

Notice is hereby given that the undersigned Citizens of the United States over the age of twenty-one years on the 2nd day of May 1898 discovered a vein or lode of Quartz or sand rock in place bearing Gold Silver and Lead within the limits of the Claim hereby located and have this 10th day of May 1898 under and in accordance with the Revised Statutes of the United States located fifteen hundred linear feet of this vein or lode in length, with surface ground three hundred feet in width on each side of the center of said lode situated in the Copper Creek Mining District County of Spokane and State of Washington and known as the May Day Number 1 Mining Claim and extending fifteen hundred feet to and from this notice at the discovery or prospect shaft; the exterior boundaries of this claim being distinctly marked by reference to natural objects or permanent monuments, and more particularly described as follows, to-wit:

May Day Number one (1) is situated in Mance Mountain. The discovery shaft is on the center-line about 50 feet upon said mountain from the East Fork of the Lewis River. The May Day No 1 crosses the East Fork of the Lewis River about 1/2 mile east from the mouth of M. Finley Creek. Starting at the discovery shaft this claim runs southerly 300 feet thence Easterly about 15° to south 300 feet thence southerly 600 feet thence westerly about 15° to north 1500 thence southerly 600 feet thence Easterly about 15° to south 200 feet thence southerly along the first line 300 feet to place of beginning. All posts and the corner posts are given cornered and are plainly marked and that we intend to hold and work said above described claim as provided by the local laws, and the Customs and rules of miners, and mining statutes and laws of the United States
