 These presents Shall Come- Greeting:

Whereas, There has been deposited in the General Land Office of the United States a Certificate of the Register of the Land Office at Vancouver, Washington Territory, whereby it appears that pursuant to the Act of Congress approved 20th May 1862, "To secure Homesteads to actual Settlers on the Public Domain;" and the acts supplemental thereto, the claim of Albert G. Tucker has been established and duly consummated, in conformity to law, for the North East quarter of the North East quarter of Section Twenty, in Township Three North of Range eight East of Willamette Meridian, in Washington Territory containing Forty acres, according to the official Plat of the Survey of the said Land, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General;

Now Know Ye, That there is therefore granted by the United States unto the said Albert G. Tucker, the Tract of Land above described;

To have and to hold the said Tract of Land, with the appurtenances therof, unto the said Albert G. Tucker, and to his heirs and assigns forever, subject to any vested and accrued water rights for mining, agricultural, manufacturing or other purposes, and rights of ditches and reservoirs used in connection with such water rights, as may be recognized and acknowledged by the local customs, laws and decisions of Courts, and also subject to the right of the proprietor of a vein or ledge to extract and remove his ore therefrom should the same be found to penetrate or intersect the premises hereby granted as provided by Law.
