Know all men by these presents: That we, Ado S. Richardson and J. F. Richardson her
husband of Wasco County, Oregon, for and in consideration of the purposes hereinafter

Skamania County, State of Washington, our true and lawful attorney to act for us and in
our name, place and stead in the full control, management and disposition of that certain
