Power of Attorney.

Know all men by these presents: That, whereas, by an act of Congress approved June 4, 1897 (30 Stat. 36) it is provided: That in cases in which a tract covered by a patent is included within the limits of a public forest reservation the owner thereof may, if he desires to do so, relinquish the tract to the government, and may select in lieu thereof a tract of vacant land open to settlement, etc.

And whereas on the 16th day of April, 1904, the Ogden Land and Cattle Company, Limited, a corporation organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of New York, was the owner of the following described land: The South half of the North West quarter of Section three (3) in township fourteen (14) North, Range Ten East, Tula and Salt River meridians in the county of Coconino, Territory of Arizona, which said tract prior to said date, had been included within the limits of the Black Mesa Forest Reserve;

And whereas on the said last named day the said company surrendered the said land to the United States by deed of conveyance duly executed by which it became entitled to select other lands of equal acreage in lieu thereof; has selected the South half of the North East quarter Sec. 4, T. 3N, R. 7E W.M.

Now therefore the said Ogden Land and Cattle Company Limited has made constituted and appointed, and by these presents does make constitute and appoint Joel W. Kromy of the The Dalles in the County of Blaine State of Oregon its true and lawful attorney for it and in its name place and stead, to enter into and take possession of each and every tract of public land in any State or Territory of the United States that has been or may hereafter be selected by it in lieu of the land surrendered
