

S. P. White et al to Edward M Cox

This Indenture made the 30<sup>th</sup> day of November in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety seven between S. P. White, G. E. Berson and Douglas Caples; County of Clatsop State of Washington, parties of the first part and Edward M. Cox, County of Multnomah State of Oregon party of the second part:

Witnesseth, That the said parties of the first part for and in consideration of the sum of \$500. five hundred dollars lawful money of United States of America to them in hand paid by the party of the second part, the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged have granted, bargained, sold, remised, released and forever quit-claimed and by their presence do grant, bargain, sell, remise, release and forever quit-claim unto the said party of the second part, his heirs and assigns an undivided one quarter interest in the mining claim as located and hereinafter described:

1<sup>st</sup> - An undivided one quarter interest in the Boodle Mining Claim or lode more particularly described as follows: 1000 linear feet along the center of said vein from the discovery stake West to center East and 300 ft. in width on either side of said center line and full length of said claim as marked by monuments and blaze at corners and along outside lines being extension of the Blue Bird lode; said claim is situated in Skamania County, State of Washington on Blue Bird Creek near its head and about one mile East of Ball Mt. located on the 29<sup>th</sup> day of July, 1895. by G. E. Berson and recorded in Miscellaneous Books page 112 at the County seat of Skamania County

2<sup>nd</sup> - An undivided one quarter interest in the Kechapoo Mining Lode Claim being more fully described as follows, to-wit: 1500 linear feet in width on each side of the center of said lode situated in the Ball Mountain Mining District (unorganized) County of Skamania State of Washington and extending 1500 feet and from discovery or location notice, at discovery shaft, the exterior boundary of this claim being distinctly marked by reference to natural objects or permanent monuments and more particularly described as follows:
