

Douglas Caples to D. F. Schuele & E. L. Crawford.

This Indenture Witnesseth, that Douglas Caples, unmarried of Vancouver, Washington. in consideration of the sum of One Hundred (\$100.⁰⁰/₁₀₀) Dollars, to him in hand paid, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged, have bargained, sold and conveyed, and by these presents do bargain, sell and convey unto D. F. Schuele and E. L. Crawford of Vancouver, Wash. the following described premises, to-wit:

The one-fourth interest now owned and held by said Douglas Caples in the Kickapoo Quartz mining claim situated in the Bald Mountain Mining District, in Skamania County, Washington. The said Quartz mining claim being more particularly described as follows, to-wit:

Location Notice

Notice is hereby given the undersigned, S. P. White, D. Caples, and L. E. Beeson have this 29th day of July A.D. 1895. located according to the U. S. Mining laws and the laws of the State of Washington, this quartz ledge. Beginning at this post where this notice is posted at center of this creek and thence running in a North Easterly direction 300 ft. thence in a South Easterly direction 1500 ft., thence South Westerly 600 ft., thence 1500 ft., in a North Westerly direction.
