

H. M. Broadbent to Henry W. Coe.

Know All Men By These Presents, that I F. M. Broadbent, of Lewis County State of Washington in consideration of the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) to me paid by Henry W. Coe, of Portland Multnomah County State of Oregon do hereby remise, release and forever quit claim unto the said Henry W. Coe and to his heirs and assigns all my right title and interest in and to the Chicago North West Discovery No. 2. Claim, in St. Helens mining district Kamania County State of Washington, said claim having been located by me on the 1st day of January 1900 notice of which location was recorded in the Auditor's office of said Kamania County on the 18th day of January 1900, said claim being more particularly described as follows:-

Being on Viola Mountain in the Spirit Lake Range in said St. Helens mining district, and about one mile northwesterly of the Lauman cabin and about fifteen hundred feet northwesterly from the Broadbent Cabin and the tunnel on the Chicago North West Discovery Claim, and about one and a quarter mile westerly from Mt. Piomack, and about eight miles northerly from Mt. St. Helens, being bounded and described as follows:- Beginning at a Larch tree marked with four notches, being the most easterly corner of said claim and being most northerly corner of the Chicago North West Discovery Claim, and proceeding thence in a northwesterly direction seven hundred and fifty feet to a larch tree blazed on two sides, which tree marks the center of the northeasterly side line of said claim, thence seven hundred and fifty feet on the same northwesterly course to a hemlock blazed on four sides which tree marks the most northerly corner of said claim, thence in a southwesterly direction six hundred feet to a larch post blazed on three sides, which post marks the most westerly corner of said claim, thence seven hundred and fifty feet in a southeasterly direction to a hemlock tree marked with two crosses cut thereon which tree marks the center of the southwesterly side line of said claim, thence seven hundred and fifty feet on the same southeasterly course to a larch tree marked with six notches which tree marks the most southerly corner of said
