Sibley, of Rochester, of the County of Monroe, and State of New York, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged have granted, bargained and sold, and by these presents do grant, bargain, sell, convey and confirm unto the said Hiram W. Sibley and to his heirs and assigns forever, all of that certain tract of land lying and being in the County of Skamania, State of Washington, and particularly described as follows to-wit: The Lot numbered One, the North East quarter of the North West quarter and the North half of the North East quarter of Section Nineteen, in Township Two North of Range Six East of Willamette meridian, containing One Hundred and Fifty-eight acres and Fifty-five hundredths of an acre.
