The northwest quarter ($NW\frac{1}{4}$) of northwest quarter ($NW\frac{1}{4}$); the South half ($S\frac{1}{2}$) of northwest quarter ($NW\frac{1}{4}$) and the south half ($S\frac{1}{2}$) of northeast quarter ($NE\frac{1}{4}$) of Section eight (8), township four (4) south, range fourteen (14) east, Willamette Meridian.

Commencing at a point in section seven (7), township four (4) south range fourteen (14) east, Willamette Meridian, in said Wasco County, on the south line of the land now or formerly belonging to the Wasco Warehouse Milling Company, an Oregon corporation, said point of commencement being 1340 feet west and 660 feet south of the northeast corner of said section seven (7) and running thence west 9 chains; thence south $16^{\circ}55'$ west 2.55 chains; thence south 3.53 chains; thence south 18° east 1.75 chains; thence south $81^{\circ}33'$ east 2.28 chains; thence north $72^{\circ}20'$ east 4.49 chains; thence north $47^{\circ}9'$ east 2.10 chains; thence north $21^{\circ}32'$ east 3.27 chains; thence north $6^{\circ}5'$ east 5 chains; thence north $45^{\circ}35'$ east 2.95 chains to the south line of the property now or formerly belonging to said Wasco Warehouse Milling Company; thence west 6.75 chains to the place of beginning, containing 14.91 acres, more or less.
