

United States "to" Mary Wil-wy-i-tit

The United States of America

To all to whom these presents shall come, Greeting

Whereas, There has been deposited in the General Land Office of the United States a schedule of allotments of land, dated May 10, 1893, from the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, approved by the acting Secretary of the Interior May 11, 1893, whereby it appears that under the provisions of the Act of Congress approved February 8, 1887 (24 Stats 388,) Mary Wil-wy-i-tit an Indian of the Cascades tribe or band has been allotted the following described lands, viz:


The South East quarter of Section thirty three in Township two North of Range six East of Willamette Meridian in the State of Washington containing One hundred and sixty acres.

I now know you, that the United States of America in consideration of the premises and in accordance with the provisions of the fifth section of said Act of Congress of the 8th February, 1887, "hereby Declares" that it does and will hold the land thus allotted (subject to all the restrictions and conditions contained in said fifth section) for the period of twenty five years in trust for the sole use and benefit of the said Mary Wil-wy-i-tit or in case of her decease, for the sole use of her heirs, according to the laws of the State or Territory where such land is located and that at the expiration of said period the United States will convey the same by patent to said Indian or her heirs, as aforesaid, in fee discharged of said trust and free of all charge or incumbrance whatsoever; Provided, That the President of the United States may, in his discretion, extend the said ~~Period~~.

In Testimony whereof, I, Grover Cleveland President of the United States of America, have caused these letters to be made Patent and the seal of the General Land Office to be countersigned affixed.
