according to the Official Plat of the Survey of the said Land, returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General:

NOW KNOW YE, That there is, therefore, granted by the United States unto the said Herbert I. Farrington the tract of land above described; TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the said tract of Land, with the appurtenances thereof, unto the said Herbert I. Farrington and to his heirs and assigns forever; subjected to any vested and accrued water rights for mining, agricultural, manufacturing or other purposes, and rights to ditches and reservoirs used in connection with such water rights, as may be recognized and acknowledged by the local customs, laws, and decisions of courts, and also subject to the right of the proprietor of a vein or lode to extract and remove his ore therefrom, should the same be found to penetrate or intersect the premises hereby granted, as provided by law. And there is reserved from the lands hereby granted, a right of way thereon for ditches or canals constructed by the Authority of the United States.

Alexander and to her heirs, and assigns forever; subject to any vested and accrued water rights for mining, agricultural, manufacturing, or other purposes, and rights to ditches and reservoirs used in connection with such water rights, as may be recognized and acknowledged by the local customs, laws, and decisions of courts, and also subject to the right of the proprietor of a vein or lode to extract and remove his ore therefrom, should the same be found to penetrate or intersect the premises hereby granted, as provided by law; and there is reserved from the lands hereby granted, a right of way thereon for ditches or canals constructed by the authority of the United States.
