Skamania County, in an area designated as Special Management Area (SMA) Forest land under Skamania County Ordinance No. 1993-04. FPA 11-20580 was appealed by the Gorge Commission, Central Cascade Alliance (CCA), and the United States Forest Service. Exhibit 2. Appellants allege, among other things, that DNR's approval violates Skamania County Ordinance No. 1993-04. Because the application and enforcement of Skamania County Ordinance No. 1993-04 is at issue in this appeal, Skamania County is a necessary party and must be joined.

The Forest Practices Act reflects the legislature's recognition that when county interests are involved the county should be a party to an FPAB action. RCW 76.09.050(6) -(9). Skamania County has already claimed an interest in the subject matter at issue in this appeal: regulation of forest practices in a portion of the Gorge Scenic Area that is located in Skamania County. It has staked its claim by adopting Ordinance No. 1993-04, which provides regulatory standards more stringent than the Forest Practices Act for regulation of forest practices in the GMA open space. Answering the legal questions raised by this appeal, in the county's absence, could well impair the county's ability to enforce its own ordinance.

A decision in the county's absence could also leave parties at risk of incurring inconsistent obligations by reason of the counties interest. For example, if the FPAB rules that only the Forest Practices Act applies to regulation of forest practices in the GMA open space, and the county is not a party, the county might still attempt to enforce its own ordinance to the detriment of the landowner. For a second example, the FPAB could rule that the Skamania County Ordinance is the applicable standard in the SMA Open Space and that the county has the authority and duty to enforce its ordinance. If the county is not a party to the appeal, the county may refuse to enforce its ordinance despite the 26 FPAB ruling and the appellants will not have obtained relief.

- 3. The attached application/notification for a forest practice was received by the Department of Natural Resources on November 2, 1995 and notice of such approval showing the date thereof is attached. (Exhibit "A")
- 4. Lands within the jurisdiction and interests of the Columbia River Gorge Commission, a regional agency, and Central Cascades Alliance, are affected by the approval.
- 5. The same lands within the jurisdiction of the Columbia River Gorge Commission are a special interest of the Central Cascades Alliance ("CCA"); CCA is a nonprofit corporation dedicated to protecting the long term economic, cultural and biological sustainability of the

Central Cascades community, with an emphasis on the area between Mt. Adams (in Washington) and Mt. Hood (in Oregon).

6. The approval by the Department of Natural Resources of the forest practice was invalid and without authority because it involves a forest practice governed by the purposes and standards of the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area Act, the Columbia River Gorge Compact adopted by Washington and Oregon incorporating the National Scenic Area Act, the Management Plan required by the National Scenic Area Act (approved by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Porest Service and the Columbia River Gorge Commission), and Skamania County Ordinance No. 1993-04 (which implements the Management Plan within Stamania County).

The forest practice is inconsistent with and violates the National Scenic Area Act, the Columbia River Gorge Compact, the Management Plan adopted thereunder, and Skamania County Ordinance No. 1993-04.

The practice specifically violates the Management Plan of the National Scenic Area Act and the Skamania County Ordinance by allowing the harvesting of timber on lands within the Special Management Area of the National Scenic Area directly contrary to numerous Special Management Area guidelines for protection of natural and scenic resources, and in a manner that will adversely affect those resources. Timber harvesting on lands within the Special Management Area is allowed by the Management Plan and the ordinance only if it is consistent with those guidelines.

- 7. All state agencies are specifically required to carry out their functions in accordance with the National Scenic Area Act and the Columbia River Gorge Compact. 16 USC 544; RCW 43.97.025(1). The Department's approval of this forest practice thus violates these statutes and the Management Plan of the National Scenic Area, as well as the Skamania County Ordinance.
- 8. The U.S. Porest Service reviewed the application and determined on November 16, 1995 it is inconsistent with the National Scenic Area Act and the Management Pian. (Brhibit "B")
- 9. On November 15, 1995, Jonathan Doherty, Executive Director of the Columbia River Gorge Commission, submitted a comment letter to the Department of Natural Resources on the proposed application. In his letter, Mr. Doherty indicated the manner in which the proposal is in conflict with the Management Plan guidelines for forest practices in Special Management Areas as well as the Columbia River Gorge Compact. (Exhibit "C")

REQUEST FOR EMERGENCY STAY AND, HEARING AND STAY

The appellants, Columbia River Gorge Commission and Central Cascades Alliance, respectfully request (1) an emergency stay; and, (2) a hearing and stay, pending disposition of this appeal. It is critical for the Board to preserve the status quo pending the resolution of this case in order to prevent irreparable harm, while appellants pursue their request to reverse the Department's decision.

The emergency stay is essential at this point in time. In contrast to other cases involving DNR, appellants have no idea when harvesting will actually begin at the site. The Department's decision does not include any requirement for advance notice to the appellants of when the cutting of trees will begin. Moreover, the site is not visible and thus, it is not possible to find out when the harvest starts through scrutiny from an adjacent area. Finally, although a request was made to DNR to provide advance notice to the Gorge Commission of the cutting of trees, DNR's response was noncommittal. Thus, appellants must obtain an emergency stay pending a hearing on a regular stay in order to prevent irreparable harm and protect the resources at stake.

The proposed forest practice is located in a Special Management Area that contains sensitive and significant natural and scenic resources. The proposed timber harvesting in this area, pending a hearing on the merits of this appeal, will irreparably harm these resources protected by law, before the Porest Practices Appeals Board has rendered a final decision. The resources are unique and irreplaceable, and include the following: highly scenic vistas visible from prominent public trails in the National Scenic Area, documented sites of sensitive wildlife species (Larch Mountain salamander), sensitive wildlife habitat (big game winter range), old growth forests, wetlands and streams. The proposed timber harvest violates the Management Plan and ordinance guidelines for protection of all of these resources.

In a November 13, 1995 letter to the Department of Natural Resources, Bryan Cowan, Regional Habitat Program Manager for the Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife, stated that Larch Mountain salamanders were found at seven locations within the proposed harvest unit. This species is listed as sensitive by both the state of the Washington and the Management Plan. The letter further states: "The proposed timber harvest would compromise the continued existence of this species within the harvest unit." (Exhibit "D") The forest practice will thus cause irreparable harm to this sensitive species, damaging a public resource.

For these reasons, appellants have no adequate remedy at law and respectfully request a stay, pending a hearing on the appeal.

I have received a revised copy of your Forest Practices
Application/Notification, A-11-20580, that was resubsitted to the Washington
State Department of Natural Resources (DMR) on November 11, 1995. We have
reviewed the forest practice as proposed by this DMR Application/Notification
pursuant to the Columbia River Gorge Maticnal Scenic Area Act and Management
Plan.

A previous Application/Notification was submitted to the DNR on April 26, 1995. Since that time, there has been a change in the land owner and a modification of the hervest units and barvest methods. This review will consider the revised Forest Practices Application/Notification on its own marits.

The proposed forest practice is located in section 7, T.3M., R.9R., surveyed Skamania County, Washington and within a Special Hungament Area of the Columbia Riwir Gorge National Scenic Area (MSA). The MSA Land Use Designation is Forest hand.

The Forest Practices Application/Motification in the Timber Marvest Section indicates that the type of harvest will be even-aged on 147 moras (sic) of a 240 more percel. This is to be accomplished by four harvest units of 12, 10, 85 and 30 mores. There are to be 8 trees per acre remaining after harvest. Harvest method will be by shovel, rubber-tired skidder, swing yarder and helicopter.

Por an analysis or assessment of any land use action for compliance with the IMA Management Flan, it is the standard policy of this office to conduct a field review to complete resource surveys. However, at your direction, an on-site field review of your proposed forest practice was not allowed. This direction was indicated in personal discussion with David Sell, Land Use Coordinator for the MSA, on Movember 16, 1995. Consequently, our review is based primarily on the information provided in the DNR application. While a field review is likely to find additional concerns, this review is based only on the information submitted with the DNR application.

An enalysis of the proposed action and the guidelines indicate that the forest practice, as submitted to the DNR, is inconsistent with the NAA Act and Management Plan for the following rescons:

NSA Management Plan, Part I, Chapter 1, SMA Guidelines, (4) (D), *the maximum size of any created opening shall be 15 acres.*

Two even age harvest units of 85 and 10 acres with five trees per acre romaining after hervest are proposed. "Even-aged harvest" (DNR application) meets the definition of a greated forest opening with less than 80 percent grown closure of trees less than 20 feet tall. As 85 or 30 acre opening would exceed the 18 acre maximum.

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NSA Management Plan, Part I, Chapter 3, SNA Guidelines, (c)(A)(1), *a buffer some shall be created around sensitive wildlife and sensitive plant species. (b), A buffer some for sites of sensitive wildlife species, such as nesting, roosting and perching sites as defined by species requirements and other state or federal agency biologists. A sensitive wildlife species is defined in the Management Plan Glossary as an animal species that is "listed as endangered, threstened, sensitive, or condidate, by the Masshington Wildlife Commission."

This forest practice proposal was reviewed by the State of Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDYN). Their comments and recommendations were included in a June 16, 1995 letter to Lloyd Handlos, Porest Practices Coordinator, DMR, from Bryan Cowan, Regional Mahitat Program Manager, WDFW (see attached letter). The letter states that "during recent field inspections, WDFW biologists discovered Larch Mountain salamenders (Plethodos larselli) at seven separate locations at the east end of the harvest unit. "The letter also indicates that this area of the parcel schibits typical habitat characteristic of the salamender as reported in literature for this species. An attached map designates the Larch Mountain salamender locations and habitat. These areas are located in harvest units C and D of the revised Porest Practice Application/Motification.

The letter also states that the Larch Mountain calamander is classified as "sensitive" under WAC 233-12-297 and is listed as "sensitive" by the Mashington Wildlife Commission. It is also listed in the MSA Management Plan <u>Table 6</u> for Mashington Endangered, Threatened, and Sensitive Wildlife Species in The Columbia Gorge as a candidate species.

The MDFW recommendations state that a "no-harvest area shall be physically flagged in the field, through on-site consultation with MDFW, prior to start of forest practice activities." Harvest operations as currently proposed are to coour within a sensitive species habitat area. No buffer zones have been provided. There are no conditions included in the forest practice to protect this sensitive species or its habitat. This occorn is raised in a follow-up letter of November 13, 1995, to the DNR from the MDFW that states that "the proposed timber harvest would compromise the continued existence of this species within the harvest unit."

MSA Management Plan, Part I, Chapter 3, SMA Guidelines, (6)(C)(S), "In areas of big game winter range, adequate thermal cover shall be maintained, as determined by the appropriate state wildlife agency."

Big game winter range includes winter range for Deer and Elk. A review of the MEA resource inventory indicates that the western portion of the parcel is within a Mashington State Department of Middlife Priority Mabitat for Deer and Elk Minter Range. Marvest operations (Units A and C) as currently proposed will occur within this priority habitat or area of winter range. The proposed harvest for these units will remove all but 5 trees per acre within the areas of priority habitat for Deer and Minter Range. There are no conditions in the proposed forest practice to assure that adequate thereas cover is maintained. Due to this the type of harvest, it appears that big game winter range may be adversely impacted.

MSA Management Plan, Part I, Chapter I, SMA Guidelines, (6) (0) (6) (a), "Six live trope per acre, three of which shall be of the largest tree size available and three of which shall be of various sizes to provide replacements as snags and wildlife tree; and three dead trees per acre, of the largest tree size swallable; and three down trees per acre in the largest tree size available. All trees shall be unburned."

The DNF forest practice application/notification indicates that only five trees per sore of an unknown size would remain following harvest.

Aerial photos of the area reveal that the northwest portion of the parcel or harvest unit A of the forest practice exhibits potential old growth characteristics as described above. However, a field visit is necessary to adequately determine the full extent and existence of old growth forest characteristics.

For this proposal to be consistent with the NEA Management Plan, the forest practice would need to be modified to comply with the guidelines as stated above and any other applicable guidelines from the Management Plan.

A written request for review of this consistency determination may be made to the Regional Porester, 313 g.W. Pirst Street, Portland, Or 97204, within 45 days of the date of this letter. A statement of reasons in support of the request should be included.

The following comment letter regards the above-referenced forest practice application submitted to your agency by the Seeder Tree Company. It involves lands in the Special Management Area of the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area, within Skamania County. Comments from reviewers are due by November 16, 1995.

This forest practice application is inconsistent with the Management Plan for the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area (Management Plan) governing forest practices in Special Management Areas, as well as Skamania County Ordinance # 1993-04, which implements the Management Plan. On May 5, 1995, I wrote your agency a letter on a prior version of this application that was subsequently withdrawn. The current application's inconsistencies are the same as those described in that letter. A copy of that letter is enclosed herein. I will thus summarize the inconsistencies of the current application in this letter. Please refer to the May 5 letter for additional details.

The application in inconsistent with the following guidelines governing forest practices in Special Management Areas:

Guideline 6.B(2), page I-124;

A minimum 200-foot buffer zone shall be created on the landward side of each wetland, pond, or lake; or a wider variance from this requirement shall be determined during the site plan analysis of the wetland or riparian area and those species inhabiting the area, as determined by the Porest Service biologist in consultation with state and/or federal agencies.

Guldeline 6.B(3), page 1-125:

A 200-foot buffer zone shall be created along each fish-bearing and perennial stream.

Guideline 6.B(4), page 1-125:

A 50-foot buffer shall be created along intermittent streams.

Guldeline 4.D, page 1-44;

The maximum size of any created opening shall be 15 acres.

Ouldeline 6.C(5):

In areas of big game winter range, adequate thermal cover shall be maintained, as determined by the appropriate state wildlife agency.

In addition to the above inconsistencies, the application is also inconsistent with guideline 6, A(1), page I-124, which requires a buffer zone where no logging is allowed for sensitive wildlife species sites. The harvest area includes documented sites for the Larch Mountain salamander, classified as a sensitive species by both the Management Plan and the state of Washington. A June 16, 1995 letter to Lloyd Handlos from Bryan Cowan, Regional Habitat Program Manager for WDPW, documents these points. Mr. Cowan recommended that harvesting be prohibited in salamander habitat areas to prevent adverse impacts to this public resource from this harvest. The current application includes harvesting in these areas. Mr. Cowan also recommended in this letter that the harvest application should be modified to be consistent with the Sconic Area SMA guidelines.

Approval of this application, without necessary modifications to render it consistent with the Management Plan and county ordinance, would violate state law. The Columbia River Gorge Compact requires that state agencies carry out their respective functions and responsibilities in accordance with the Management Plan and implementing ordinances [RCW 43.97.025]. I thus urge you to deny this application as proposed. Thank you for this opportunity so comment.

The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife (WDFW) is submitting this letter as a follow-up to our June 16, 1995 comments prepared in response to the above-referenced forest practices application. We understand that the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) has received all necessary information requested of the applicant, and that a decision on this application is pending. However, WDFW's believes that our concerns regarding protection of wildlife resources have not yet been adequately addressed in accordance with the Skamania County's Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area (CRGNSA). Ordinance, and the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area Act. We offer the following comments and recommendations for your consideration.

The project site is located within the Special Management Area (SMA) of the CRGMSA. The CRGMSA Ordinance contains special provisions for protecting fish and wildlife resources in the SMA, including species listed as endangered, threatened, or sensitive. As you are aware, Larch Mountain salamenders, a state listed sensitive species, have been found at seven locations within the proposed harvest unit. The proposed timber harvest would compromise the continued existence of this species within the harvest unit. WDFM's concerns regarding potential adverse impacts to this species are detailed in our previous comments submitted for this proposal.

Section 22.16.030 of the CRGNSA Ordinance requires preparation of a natural resource mitigation plan and compliance with minimum natural resource protection standards when uses are proposed within sensitive wildlife sites or buffer zones. This plan

requires identification of measures to protect natural resources from adverse impacts, and demonstration that mitigation measures would ensure the protection, long-term viability, and function of sensitive wildlife sites. Other CRGNSA Ordinance requirements applicable to this proposal include, but are not limited to, the following: establishment of protective buffer zones around sensitive wildlife sites; protection of old growth forest; maintenance of snage, downed logs and recruitment trees; and provision of 200 foot buffers along all ponds, lakes and fish-bearing and perennial streams. This proposal, as currently designed, does not comply with the CRGNSA Ordinance requirements.

WDFW recognizes that it is currently unclear which agency is responsible for regulating forest practices under the CRGNSA Ordinance. However, WDFW believes that full compliance with the CRGNSA Ordinance would be necessary to adequately protect wildlife resources at the project site.

- The appellant hereby elects a formal hearing.
- 3. The attached forest practices application was approved by the Department of Natural Resources on November 20, 1995.
- 4. Forest Practices Application A-11-20580, was submitted to the Washington State Department of Natural Resources (DNR) on November 2, 1995, by David L. Thompson of Seeder Tree Company, Inc., 105 East 8th Street, Olympia, MA 98501 on land owned by Seeder Tree Company, Inc. This is a revised Forest Practice that was originally submitted on April 26, 1995.

This forest practice is located within the boundaries of a Special Management Area within the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area (CRGNSA). Forest practices within the Special Management Area are subject to the provisions of the Columbia River Gorge National Scenic Area Act, Public Law 99-663, Nov. 17, 1986, and compliance with the Management Plan for the CRGNSA. It is also subject to Skamania County Land Use Ordinances, adopted pursuant to the CRGNSA Act and the Management Plan.

The DNR approval of this forest practice is improper as it violates The CRGNSA Act and the Skamania County Land Use Ordinances, and RCW 43.97.025(1) which requires the DNR to carry out its functions in compliance with the terms of the CRGNSA Act.

This forest practice is located in section 7, T.3N., R.9B., surveyed in Skamania County, Washington within a Special Management Area of the CRGNSA. This parcel of land is also designated Forest Land in the Management Plan for the CRGNSA.

The Forest Practices Application indicates that the type of harvest will be even aged on 147 acres (sic) of a 240 acre parcel. This is to be accomplished by four harvest units of 12, 10, 85 and 30 acres. There will be 5 trees per acre remaining after harvest. Harvest method will be by shovel, rubber-tired skidder, swing yarder and helicopter. Harvest activities would be conditioned by the DNR to meet minimum standards for resource protection as directed only by Washington Forest Practice rules.

Under the Management Plan, developed pursuant to the CRGNSA Act, the Forest Service is responsible for the review of forest practices for compliance with the guidelines of the Management Plan regarding forest practices within Special Management Areas of the National Scenic Area. However, the state forest practice agencies are directed to regulate forest practices using the Management Plan guidelines.

The <u>Management Plan</u>, Part II, SMA Provisions, SMA Policies (5), page II-36, states that *Bach state forest practice agency should regulate forest practices in the SMA, using the SMA guidelines for protection of the scenic, cultural, recreation, and natural resources, with the Forest Service providing the review for compliance with these guidelines.*

A Porest Service staff analysis of the proposed forest practice, as described in the DNR Application, finds that the project is clearly inconsistent with the CRGNSA Management Plan and CRGNSA Ordinance as adopted by Skamania County. The following six points explain the inconsistency:

A) The <u>Management Plan</u>, Part I, Chapter 1-Scenic Resources, SMA Guidelines, (4) (D), page I-44, states that "the maximum size of any created opening shall be 15 acres."

Skamania County Ordinance 22.10.030 (C)(4) states that "the maximum size of any created opening shall be 15 acres."

Two even age harvest units of 85 and 30 acres with five trees per acre remaining after harvest are proposed. "Even-aged harvest" (DNR application) meets the definition of a created forest opening with less than 80 percent crown closure of trees less than 20 feet tall (Management Plan Glossary and Skamania County Ordinance 22.04.010 (36)). An 85 or 30 acre opening exceeds the 15 acre maximum.

B) The Management Plan, Part I, Chapter 3, SMA Guidelines, (6) (A) (1), 'a buffer zone shall be created around sensitive wildlife and sensitive plant species. (b), A buffer zone for sites of sensitive wildlife species, such as nesting, roosting and perching sites as defined by species requirements and other state or federal agency biologists." A sensitive wildlife species is defined in the Management Plan Glossary as an animal species that is "listed as endangered, threatened, sensitive, or candidate by the Washington Wildlife Commission."

Skamania County Ordinance 22.16.030 (8) (1) states that "the following buffer zones shall be created around sensitive wildlife and sensitive plant species. b), A buffer zone for sites of sensitive wildlife species, such as nesting, roosting and perching sites as defined by species requirements and defined by a Forest Service biologist in consultation with other state or federal agency. biologists." 22.04.010 (127) "sensitive wildlife species" means animal species that are: (a) Listed as endangered or threatened pursuant to federal or state endangered species acts, (b) Listed as endangered, threatened, sensitive or candidate by the Washington Wildlife Commission."

This forest practice proposal was reviewed by the State of Washington Department of Pish and Wildlife (WDFW). Their comments and recommendations were included in a June 16, 1995 letter to Lloyd Handlos, Porest Practices Coordinator, DNR, from Bryan Cowan, Regional Habitat Program Manager, WDFW (see attached letter). The letter states that "during recent field inspections, WDFW biologists discovered Larch Mountain salamanders (Plethodon larselli) at seven separate locations at the east end of the harvest unit." The letter also indicates that this area of the parcel exhibits typical habitat characteristic of the salamander as reported in literature for this species. An attached map designates the Larch Mountain salamander locations and habitat. These areas are located in harvest units C and D of the revised Forest Practice Application.

The letter also states that the Larch Mountain salamander is classified as "sensitive" under WAC 232-12-297 and is listed as "sensitive" by the Mashington Wildlife Commission. It is also listed in the CRGNSA Management Plan Table 6 for Washington Endangered, Threatened, and Sensitive Wildlife Species in The Columbia Gorge as a candidate species.

The WDFW recommendations state that a "no-harvest area shall be physically flagged in the field, through on-site consultation with WDFW, prior to start of forest practice activities." Harvest operations as currently proposed are to occur within a sensitive species habitat area. No buffer zones have been provided. There are no conditions included in the forest practice to protect this sensitive species or its habitat. This concern is raised in a follow-up letter of November 13, 1995, to the DNR from the WDFW that states that "the proposed timber harvest would compromise the continued existence of this species within the harvest unit."

C) The <u>Management Plan</u>, Part I, Chapter 3, SMA Guidelines, (6) (B) (2), page I-124, states that a minimum 200-foot buffer zone shall be created on the leeward side of each wetland, pond, or lake; or a wider variance from this requirement shall be determined during the site plan analysis of the wetland or riparian area and those species inhabiting the area, as determined by the Forest Service biologist in consultation with state and/or federal agencies.*

Skamania County Ordinance 22.14.040 (C) states that "buffers shall be required for all regulated activities adjacent to regulated wetlands, lakes and ponds. All buffers shall be measured from the wetland, lake or pond boundary as established pursuant to Subsection B hereof." 22.14.040 (B) (5) states that "buffer zones shall be measures outward from a wetlands, lake or pond boundary on a horizontal scale that is perpendicular to the wetland, lake or pond boundary. The following buffer zone widths shall be required:"

SMA: ALL WETLANDS, PONDS OR LAKES: 200 PRET (Minimum, as determined by the Forest Service biologist in consultation with state and/or federal agencies)

There are several ponds (wetlands) of various sizes within the area of harvest operation. Harvest operations, as currently proposed, would follow only state forest practices rules which are less than Management Plan guidelines. Washington State Forest Practice Rules and Regulations Title 222 WAC (WAC 222-30-020 (7) classify wetlands as:

Type A, which are at least 1/2 acre in size, have few or no trees, touch or surround at least 1/2 acre of open water which must be present for at least seven days between April 1 and October 1, and all bogs and fens larger than 1/4 acre in size.

Type B, which are at least 1/4 acre in size, have few or no trees, and touch or surround less than 1/2 acre of open water or no open water at all.

Washington State Forest Practice rules require for Type A wetlands, an average Wetland Management Zone width of 50 feet with a minimum of 75 trees per acregreater than 6 inch diameter breast height (DBH) for wetlands for wetlands of 0.25 acres to 5 acres and all bogs/fens greater than 5 acres. Type B wetlands are require a 25 foot minimum Wetland Management Zone with a minimum of 75 trees per acre greater than 6 inch diameter breast height (DBH) for wetlands 0.5 acre to 5 acre in size. Type B wetlands, less than 0.25 acre, do not require a Wetland Management Zone.

D) The <u>Management Plan</u>, Part I, Chapter 3, SMA Guidelines, (6) (B) (3), page I-125, states that 'A 200-foot buffer shall be created along each fish bearing and perennial stream."

Skamania County Ordinance 22.14.040 (D) states that "the following buffer widths shall be required:"

SMA Pish-bearing and perennial streams: at least 200 feet.

Inventory maps and the presence of perennial ponds and wetlands indicate the presence of perennial streams within the proposed harvest areas. There are no buffers proposed to meet the guidelines of the Management Plan. Harvest operations, as currently proposed, would only follow State Forest Practices rules which are less than Management Plan guidelines. Washington State Forest Practice Rules and Regulations Title 222 WAC (WAC 222-30-020 (3) require a minimum 25 feet width to a maximum 75 feet width Riparian Management Zone for Type 1 & 2 water (stream) less than 75 feet wide with a minimum of 100 trees per 1000 feet length of stream for each side. The Management Plan, Part I, Chapter 3, SMA Guidelines, (2), page I-123, states that: "buffer zones are to be undisturbed unless it has been shown that no practicable alternatives exist, as evidenced by completion of a practicable alternative test."

E) The <u>Management Plan</u>, Part I, Chapter 3, SMA Guidelines, (6) (C) (a), page I-126, states that "Six live trees per acre, three of which shall be of the largest tree size available and three of which shall be of various sizes to provide replacements as snags and wildlife trees; and three dead trees per acre, of the largest tree size available; and three down trees per acre in the largest tree size available. All trees shall be unburned."

Skamania County Ordinance 22.16.030 (E) (2) (f) states that "Forest Practices shall maintain the following:"

'i) six live trees per acre, three of which shall be of the largest tree size available and three of which shall be of various sizes to provide replacements as snags and wildlife trees; and three dead trees per acre, of the largest tree size available; and three down trees per acre in the largest tree size available. All trees shall be unburned.

The DNR forest practice application indicates that only five trees per acre of an unknown size would remain following harvest.

F) The Management Plan, Part I, Chapter 3, SMA Guidelines, (6) (D) (1), "new uses shall avoid disturbance to old growth forests." Old growth is defined in the Management Plan as "Any stand of trees 10 acres or greater generally containing the following characteristics: 1) contain mature and overmature trees in the overstory and are well into a matured growth state; 2) in coniferous forests, will usually contain a multilayered canopy and trees of several age classes; 3) in coniferous, standing trees and down material are present; and 4) evidences of man's activities may be present, but don't significantly alter the other characteristics and would be a subordinate factor in description of such a stand."

Skamania County Ordinance 22.16.030 (E) (3) (a) states that "New uses shall avoid disturbance to old growth forests.

Aerial photos reveal that the northwest portion of the parcel, or harvest unit A, of the forest practice area exhibits potential old growth characteristics as described above. However, a field visit is necessary to adequately determine the full extent and existence of an old growth forest characteristics.

All state agencies have authority and are required to carry out their functions in accordance with the CRGNSA Act per RCW 43.97.025(1).

The first purpose of the CRGNSA Act is to protect and enhance the scenic, cultural and natural, and recreation resources of the Columbia River Gorge, Sec. 3(1). Provisions of the CRGNSA Act also provide direction and standards for the development of a Management Plan. The Guidelines of the Management Plan are specific and literal criteria to assure protection of resources. Noncompliance with the guidelines and implementation of an inconsistent action is a violation of the Act through violation of the first purpose.

If the forest practice proceeds and is implemented, significant adverse affects to the resources of the CRGNSA would occur. The first purpose of the Act and compliance with the Management Plan and Skamania County Land Use Ordinances would not be met and violations of RCW 43.97.025(1) would occur. This forest practice as approved by the DNR also violates the intent of the Washington State Porest Practices Rules and Regulations, Title 222 WAC, for . protection of public resources. Further, RCW 43.97.025(1) would be violated since the DNR has not carried out its function in compliance with the CRGNSA Act and the terms of the Management Plan.

- The Forest Service seeks the following relief:
- A) Temporary suspension of the DNR approval of this forest practice pending this appeal.
- B) Modification of the forest practice to meet requirements of the Management Plan and the Skamania County Ordinances.
- C) Submission of the modified forest practice to the Porest Service for a compliance review with the Management Plan.
- D) Classification of this forest practice as "A Class IV-Special" under Washington State Porest Practices Rules and Regulations, WAC 222-10-010(4).

I have read the foregoing and believe the contents to be true.

RE: Rain-on-Snow Rule, WAC 222-22-100

The department has the responsibility to implement rules adopted by the Forest Practices Board. The recent rule regarding rain-on-snow and clearcut size directed the department to implement a new type of rule. This rule required the use of a new approach in the regulation of forest resources. The rule obligates the department to take a broader look at the landscape and departs from the reliance on regulations that only apply to the circumstances of a single application.

Forest practice # 20580 has been preliminarily determined to be in a significant rain-on-snow zone. Before any conditions are applied to an application, all the following circumstances must occur:

- 1. The application must be in a significant ROS zone.
- 2. There are preliminary indications of "local evidence of peak flows which have resulted in material damage to public resources".
- 3. There are significant amounts of hydrologic immaturity in the basin.
- 4. An Interdisciplinary Team (IDT) has reviewed the previous three points and has provided recommendations to the department.
- 5. The department develops conditions that reflect the on-the-ground facts and recommendations of the IDY.

The department is asking for your help to determine if there is "local evidence" as part of step two.

The forest practices rules and law require timely processing of applications. Please provide any information in writing by 5-10-95, which is 10 (ten) working days from the date of the transmittal of this forest practices application.







Dear Mr. Murley,

I have prepared the following logging and reforestation plan for David I. Thompson. This plan is designed to:

- 1. protect the growing sites for reforestation after harvest operations,
- 2. meet or exceed all standards required by the Vashington Forest Practices Act,
- 3. establish a timeline for activities related to reforesting the harvested sites,
- 4. and present a contingency plan in case the primary plan doesn't result in stocking levels required by the Act.

The plan is divided into two sites requiring different protection measures because of the difference in soils and exposure levels to extreme weather conditions. The site numbers (letters) correspond to the Unit #'s identified on page 3 of the Forest Practice Application.

UNIT #C: East and Southeast of road, below rock outcroppings. This area is now supporting a naturally seeded stand of western hemlock and Douglas fir that ranges in volume from 8 MBF to 30 MBF per acre. Slopes are moderate to steep, ranging from 10 % up to 100%. The Skamania County Soil Survey identifies the soils in this area to be Undusk Gravelly Loam with a site index of 88. I have taken 6 site index measurements equally spaced throughout the unit and determined that the actual site index ranges from 90

to 130 but is an average of 110 (Kings 50 year index). Most likely the higher than expected growth rate on the site comes from a higher rainfall than the surrounding countryside. The many times that I have been on this property over the last two years, in all seasons, are distinguished by the fact that it always seems to be raining here, even when it isn't in the surrounding hills. The fact that Augspurger Mountain is the East boundary of the property probably plays a role in creating a micro-climate with more than average rainfall for the immediate area. The existence of western hemlock on the middle and lower slopes testifies to the relatively high amount of available water in the soil.

While seedling mortality can expected to be slight, once harvested and planted, the there is some potential for soil damage by equipment operation, road building, and log skidding. To this end, the following precautions shall be taken.

- 1. Equipment operations should be allowed only when soil conditions not excessively wet. All roads must be outsloped and waterbarred or insloped and ditched with culverts spaced according to Forest Practices Act guidelines (See Forest Practices Board Manual).
- 2. No ground based equipment (skidders or shovels) should be operated in any conditions on slopes exceeding 35%.
- 3. On slopes exceeding 35%, high-lead logging systems shall be used.
- 4. Every attempt should be made to protect any established regeneration of any size.

REFORESTATION: The area will be planted with 400 to 500 2-0 Douglas fir seedlings per acre. In areas where soils are too rocky to use conventional tree planting tools, planting augers shall be used. Local planting crews, experienced in planting U.S. Forest Service clearcute in similar terrain near Mt Adams and in the Mt St Helens devastated area have the equipment and experience needed to do an adequate job of this.

Most of this stand is on North and Vest facing slopes so extreme exposure to sun and drying winds should not be substantial. However, on slopes that are exposed to East winds and drying afternoon summer sun, seedlings shall be protected by either planting within 1 foot of, and on the North side of existing stumps, or where no stumps are available, sunshades shall be used in accordance to manufacturers instructions and on the South side of planted seedlings. Sunshades specifically designed for this type of situation are available from reforestation supply catalogues.

Planting should be done in early spring as soon as the ground is not subject to frost heave-most likely in mid to late March but no later than April 15.

A regeneration survey shall be conducted as outlined in the Forest Practices Board Manual in the October following planting. If stocking levels do not meet Forest Practices Act standards at that time, an interplant or replant shall be conducted during the next planting season.

UNIT #D: Augspurger Mountain.

This area is on top of the bluff leading up to the top of Augspurger Mountain and consists of soils classified as "rock outcropping and rubble. The little soil that is available should be protected. The only practicable insurance of continuing forestation of this site is by providing a steady source of viable seed over time and by protecting the regeneration that now exists on the site. To this end, a shelterwood type system shall be employed to provide shade and a seed source.

This area will be logged by helicopter to prevent damage to soils. No skidding will be done. Timber will be felled, bucked, limbed, and then lifted straight off of the ground to avoid any soil disturbance. The landing for this operation will be the upper landing in UNIT #C. All attempts will be made to avoid damage to trees of any age in the falling and bucking operation.

Ten windfirm trees of good form and of seed bearing age shall be left per acre. These trees will be marked prior to the operation by a forester. Most likely, there are already enough

seedlings and emplings established to satisfy Forest Practices Act rules. Selection of good seed source "leave" trees will continue the process.

A regeneration survey shall be conducted as outlined in the Forest Practices Board Manual in the October following logging. If stocking levels do not meet Forest Practices Act standards at that time, an aerial seeding project shall be conducted, contingent upon the availability of an adequate supply of quality seeds, at first opportunity.

On June 15, 1995 we conducted an interdisciplinary (ID) team meeting on the site of forest practice application #A-11-20580. One issue we addressed was reforestation on the lower slopes of Ausberger Mountain on the east end of your proposal. Gerry Hoyer, silviculturist with the Department of Natural Resources' reviewed the site and submitted the attached report. In the report, Mr. Hoyer concluded that both stands reviewed were "difficult regeneration areas as defined in WAS 222-34-030 (1)". Therefore we are requesting a reforestation plan that addresses harvest systems (how you plan to protect this site during harvesting), post harvest site preparation and reforestation.

The plan should include the following:

- 1) Your plans to protect the site for reforestation during harvest operations.
- Your plans for regenerating the site to meet forest practice standards.
- 3) Timelines for regeneration of the site.
- 4) A map showing where different types of protection and regeneration measures will be used on different parts of your proposal.
- 5) A contingency plan should your primary plan not work within the timelines you submit.
- 6) The plan should address that area of your proposal that lies east and southeast of the main road through the site.

We will continue with the processing of this permit when we receive the plan. In addition, the original application was sent back to the landowner and must be returned to us. When initially submitted, questions 5, 16, 19, 22 and 23 were not answered. Please insure that the application is complete and return it to our office as soon as possible.
