PROJECT:

Place a 1997 Marlette Mobile Home (approximately 40'x26'x14') and a tool shed (approximately 10'x12'x9') on the subject property, and associated utilities.

LOCATION:

32442 State Route 14, Skamania; Section 34 of T2N, R6E, W.M. and identified as Skamania County Tax Lot #02-06-34-0-0-1904-00.

LEGAL:

ZONING:

General Management Area- Small Woodland (F-3).

DECISION:

Based upon the record and the Staff Report, the application by Michael Smith, described above, **subject to the conditions set forth in this Decision**, is found to be consistent with SCC Title 22 and is **hereby approved**.

Although the proposed development is approved, it may not be buildable due to inadequate soils for septic and/or lack of potable water. These issues are under the jurisdiction of Skamania County's Building Division and the Skamania County Health Department.

Approval of this request does not exempt the applicant or successors in interest from compliance with all other applicable local, state, and federal laws.

CONDITIONS OF APPROVAL:

The following conditions are required to ensure that the subject request is consistent with Skamania County Code Title 22. **This document, outlining the conditions of approval, must be recorded by the applicant in the deed records of the Skamania County Auditor** in order to ensure notice of the conditions of approval to successors in interest. SCC §22.06.120(C)(2).

- 1) As per SCC §22.06.120(C)(2), this Administrative Decision **SHALL BE RECORDED** by the applicant in the County deed records prior to commencement of the approved project.
- 2) All developments shall be consistent with the enclosed site plan, unless modified by the following conditions of approval. If modified, the site plan shall be consistent with the conditions of approval. (See attached)
- 3) All structures, except fences, including eaves, awnings and overhangs shall meet the following setbacks: **Front yard:** 45 feet from the centerline of the street or road or 15 feet from the front property line, whichever is greater. **Side yard:** 5 feet. **Rear yard:** 15 feet. Setbacks are established from property lines, not fence lines. If any question arises regarding the location of the property lines, the applicant shall be required to hire a professional land surveyor to locate the property lines and mark them with temporary staking prior to a building permit being issued. Staking must remain during construction and all building inspections. **A variance to the rear yard setback, 100 foot setback from the edge of the pavement of SR14, and to the 200-foot setback from adjacent property lines, has been granted allowing the placement of the proposed structures as shown on the site plan.** If a conflict arises between setbacks and buffers, the greater of the two shall prevail.
- 4) The Fire Safety Guidelines as stated in section 22.14.050(A) shall be conditions of approval:
 - a. All buildings shall be surrounded by a maintained fuel break of fifty (50) feet. Irrigated or fire resistant vegetation may be planted within the fuel break, including green lawns and low shrubs (less than twenty-four (24) inches in height). Trees should be placed greater than fifteen (15) feet between the crowns and pruned to remove dead and low (less than eight (8) feet) branches. Accumulated leaves, needles and other dead vegetation shall be removed from beneath trees.
 - b. Hazardous fuels shall be removed within the fuel break area.
 - c. Buildings with plumbed water systems shall install at least one (1) standpipe at a minimum of fifty (50) feet from the structure(s).
 - d. A pond, stream, tank or sump with storage of not less than 1,000 gallons, or a well or water system capable of delivering twenty (20) gallons per minute shall be provided. If a well pump is located on-site, the electrical service shall be separate from the dwelling.
 - e. Access drives shall be constructed to a minimum of twelve (12) feet in width and not exceed a finished grade of twelve percent (12%). Turnouts shall be provided at a minimum


- of every 500 feet. Access drives shall be maintained to a level that is passable to fire equipment. However, variances to road provisions may be made after consultation with the local fire marshal and the Washington State Department of Natural Resources.
- f. Within one (1) year of the occupancy of a dwelling, the Administrator shall conduct a review of the development to assure compliance with this section.
 - g. Telephone and power supply shall be underground whenever possible.
 - h. Roofs of structures should be made of fire-resistant materials, such as fiberglass, shingle, or tile. Roof materials such as cedar shake and shingle should not be used.
 - i. Any chimney or stovepipe on any structure for use with a wood stove or fireplace should be screened with no coarser than a quarter (1/4) inch mesh metal screen that is noncombustible and corrosion resistant and should be equipped with a spark arrestor.
 - j. All structural projections such as balconies, decks and roof gables should be built with fire resistant materials equivalent to that specified in the Uniform Building code.
 - k. Attic openings, soffit vents, foundation louvers or other ventilation openings on dwellings and accessory structures should be screened with no coarser than a quarter (1/4) inch mesh metal screen that is noncombustible and corrosion resistant.
- 5) Only that grading which is necessary for site development (building pads, utilities, etc.) is permitted. All graded areas shall be re-seeded with native vegetation prior to final inspection by the Planning Department.
- 6) The applicant and/or future owner shall be responsible for the proper maintenance and survival of any planted vegetation required under this chapter.
- 7) The combined footprint of all accessory buildings on the parcel shall not exceed 1,500 square feet in area.
- 8) A declaration shall be signed by the landowner and recorded in the Auditor's Records specifying that the owners, successors, heirs, and assigns of the subject parcel are aware that adjacent and nearby operators are entitled to carry on accepted farm and forest practices on lands classified as F-1, F-2, F-3, Ag-1, and Ag-2.
- 9) The applicant shall be required to plant two rows, each containing a minimum of 8 trees along the north property line (as shown on the site plan), in order to screen the development from SR14. At least half of any trees planted for screening purposes shall be species native to the setting. Such species include Douglas fir, grand fir, western red cedar, western hemlock, big leaf maple, vine maple, red alder, ponderosa pine, Oregon white oak and various native willows (for riparian areas). At least half of any trees planted for screening purposes shall be coniferous to provide winter screening. The applicant shall follow the recommended planting guideline that is attached to this document (from the Scenic Resources Implementation Handbook), in regards to the species, mature size, planting size height, and spacing recommendations to the maximum extent practicable within the Coniferous Woodland Landscape Setting.
- 10) The exterior of all proposed structures (siding, trim, windows, garage doors, doors, roofing, etc.) shall be dark earth-tone colors. If the applicant chooses to use colors other than those submitted,

dark earth-tone color and material samples shall be submitted to the Planning Department prior to issuance of a building permit.

- 11) The structures shall be composed of nonreflective materials or materials with low reflectivity. If the applicant chooses different materials than those approved, then material samples shall be submitted to the Planning Department prior to issuance of a building permit. Continuous surfaces of glass shall remain screened from key viewing areas.
- 12) All exterior lighting shall be hooded and shielded at a 90-degree angle. Hoods/ shields shall be made of nonreflective, opaque material, which does not allow light to pass through.
- 13) Except as necessary for site development, the existing tree cover screening the development from key viewing areas shall be retained.
- 14) The applicant shall meet all conditions of approval enacted to achieve visual subordination prior to final inspection by the Planning Department. The applicant is to coordinate all inspections with the Building Division. A final inspection approval will not be issued until compliance with all conditions of approval; including visual subordination criteria have been verified.
- 15) The Planning Department will conduct at least two site visits during construction, one to verify the location of the structures as stated by the Administrative Decision and a second to be conducted after all foundation excavation has been completed including framing footers, but prior to pouring the foundation. A site visit for Final Inspection shall also be conducted. Each inspection may take up to four business days from the time of calling for the inspection. Inspections should be arranged by calling the Building Division at 509-427-3920.
- 16) The following procedures shall be effected when cultural resources are discovered during construction activities:
 - a) Halt Construction. All construction activities within 100 feet of the discovered cultural resource shall cease. The cultural resources shall remain as found; further disturbance is prohibited.
 - b) Notification. The project applicant shall notify the Administrator and the Gorge Commission within twenty-four (24) hours of the discovery. If the cultural resources are prehistoric or otherwise associated with Native Americans, the project applicant shall also notify the Indian tribal governments within twenty-four (24) hours.
 - c) Survey and Evaluations. The Gorge Commission shall survey the cultural resources after obtaining written permission from the landowner and appropriate permits from the DAHP. (See Revised Code of Washington 27.53) It shall gather enough information to evaluate the significance of the cultural resources. The survey and evaluation shall be documented in a report that generally follows the provisions in Section 22.22.030 of this Chapter. Based upon the survey and evaluation report and any written comments, the Administrator shall make a final decision on whether the resources are significant. Construction activities may recommence if the cultural resources are not significant.

- d) **Mitigation Plan.** Mitigation plans shall be prepared according to the information, consultation and report provisions contained in Section 22.22.050 of this Chapter. Construction activities may recommence when conditions in the mitigation plan have been executed.
- 17) The following procedures shall be effected when human remains are discovered during a cultural resource survey or during construction. Human remains means articulated or disarticulated human skeletal remains, bones or teeth, with or without attendant burial artifacts.
- a) **Halt of Activities.** All survey, excavation and construction activities shall cease.
 - b) **Notification.** Local law enforcement officials, the Administrator, the Gorge Commission, and the Indian tribal governments shall be contacted immediately.
 - c) **Inspection.** The county coroner, or appropriate official, shall inspect the remains at the project site and determine if they are prehistoric/ historic or modern. Representatives of the Indian tribal governments shall be contacted immediately and have an opportunity to monitor the inspection.
 - d) **Jurisdiction.** If the remains are modern, the appropriate law enforcement official shall assume jurisdiction and the cultural resource protection process may conclude.
 - e) **Treatment.** The procedures set out in RCW 27.44 and 68.05 shall generally be implemented if the remains are prehistoric/ historic. If human remains will be reinterred or preserved in their original position, a mitigation plan shall be prepared in accordance with the consultation and report requirements set out in Section 22.22.050 of this Chapter. The mitigation plan shall accommodate the cultural and religious concerns of Native Americans. The cultural resource protection process may conclude when conditions set forth in Section 22.22.050(C) of this Chapter are met and the mitigation plan is executed.

NOTES

The applicant has been made aware of the concerns voiced by the Washington State Department of Transportation regarding the guardrail access point, traffic control, and noise level. Any new residential development, related accessory structures such as garages or workshops, fences, and additions or alterations not included in this approved site plan, will require a new application and review.

As per SCC §22.06.150(A), this Administrative Decision approving a proposed development action shall become void in two years if the development is not commenced within that period, or when the development action is discontinued for any reason for one continuous year or more.

APPEALS

The Director reserves the right to provide additional comment and findings of fact regarding this decision, if appealed.

This Administrative Decision shall be final unless reversed or modified on appeal. A written Notice of Appeal form must be filed by an interested person within 20 days from the date hereof. Appeals are to be made to the Skamania County Board of Adjustment, P.O. Box 790, Stevenson, WA 98648. Notice of Appeal forms are available at the Planning Department Office and must be accompanied by a \$500.00 nonrefundable filing fee.

WARNING

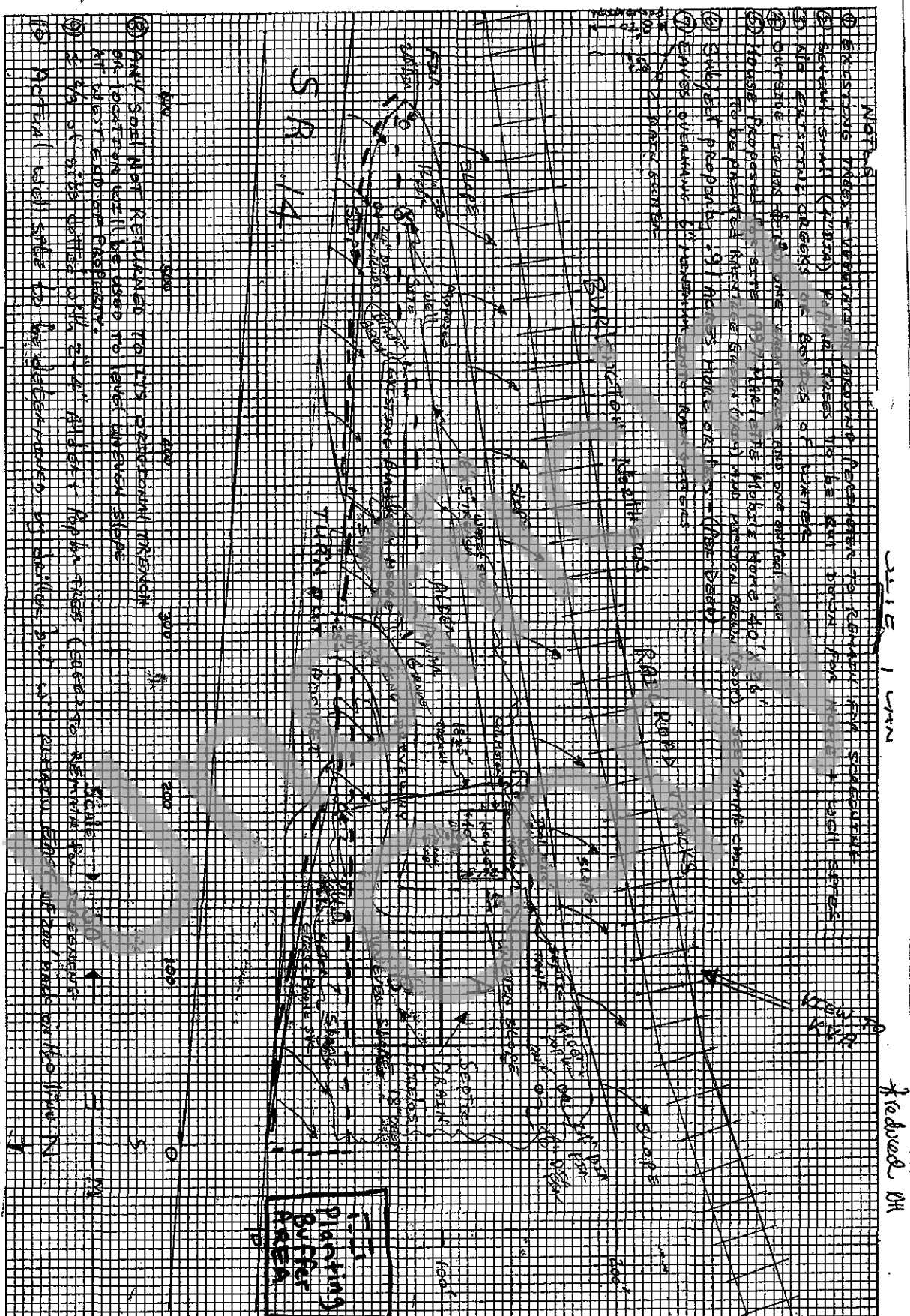
